



Dear Providers,

As you may know, there have been a growing number of confirmed measles cases in Vancouver, WA and Portland, OR. Measles is a highly contagious disease that is spread through the air. Infants are particularly vulnerable since they are unable to receive the measles vaccine until they are between 12 to 15 months of age. Please review the following information and resources, along with steps you can take to protect your children and staff.

Exposure

Talk to your families and staff about the outbreak and determine if they or their children visited any of the locations where measles exposure has been identified by the [Clark County Health Department](#). If a family was at one of these locations during the times listed, they should contact their physician and local Health Department and begin monitoring for signs and symptoms.

Immunization

Determine which of your staff and children are not fully immunized.

- Children should receive two doses of the MMR (measles-mumps-rubella) vaccine, with the first dose given between 12 to 15 months of age and a second dose at 4 to 6 years of age.
- Persons are considered immune (not susceptible) to measles if any of the following apply:
 - They were born before 1957
 - They are certain they have had measles
 - They are up to date on the measles vaccines (one dose for children 12 months through 3 years old, two doses for anyone 4 years and older)
- [Caring for Our Children 4th Edition](#) recommends that staff be current in all immunizations according to the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention](#), including the MMR vaccine.

Exclusion and Return to Care (Children/Adults/Staff)

- Notify the Health Department and immediately exclude anyone from the facility if they are diagnosed with measles.
- If someone in your facility is diagnosed with measles, it is important to inform all individuals in your facility.
- For any staff or children who are not immunized or not age-appropriately immunized, you should refer to your local Health Department official who can help guide you in this area.
- No one who has had measles can return to care until at least two weeks after the onset of rash in the last case of measles, as determined by Health Department officials.
